PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

AGRICULTURE, AGRIBUSINESS & CONSUMER HORTICULTURE

Michigan ranks second in the nation in crop diversity due to its unique climate, topography and impact of the Great Lakes. Agriculture is now one of the fastest growing sectors of the Michigan economy. MSU Extension serves the agriculture and floriculture industries by engaging in research, education and outreach that enhances the quality of life of Michigan residents.

In 2022, **1,481** Macomb County residents participated in programming related to

- animal agriculture,
- consumer and ornamental horticulture, agribusiness,
- and production of field crops, fruit crops, and vegetables

CONNECTING RESIDENTS TO RESEARCH

Organized as a statewide resource in 2010, the MSU Extension lawn and garden hotline (888-678-3464) provided answers to more than 8,000 callers per year. **72 Macomb County residents used the hotline** in 2022 to ask questions about plant identification, troubleshooting with their trees, shrubs, lawns, and vegetables, and properly understanding soil test recommendations.

Though the Ask Extension system, Michigan residents can ask questions and receive expert answers quickly on a broad range of subjects through an online form. University research-based information is provided to help residents improve their quality of life, family, garden, business, and community. In 2022, **216 Macomb County residents received answers** related to trees and shrubs, insect and plant identification, lawns, and general gardening.



In partnership with Blake Farms, MSU Extension Master Gardeners at Lavender Fest

were able to assist 525 people and answer questions on topics including invasive plants and native plant recommendations.

SMART GARDENING

Smart Gardening is an initiative that helps people become great gardeners who are environmentally savvy. It is a campaign to help home and experienced gardeners adopt and implement real-life techniques in their yard and garden that will help them save time, money and the environment. The MSU Extension team of horticulture educators uses many methods to help folks learn about being a Smart Gardener, including seminars, conferences, one-on-one education, media, public events, information booths, and more.

In 2022, **more than 1,000** Macomb County residents participated in gardening programs including: 2022 Extension Master Gardener College, Cabin Fever conversations, Smart Gardening with Vegetables 101, and workshops on pruning, container gardening, planting deer resistant bulbs and landscapes, and more.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS COMMUNITY, FOOD & ENVIRONMENT

SUPPORTING OUR NATURAL RESOURCES

Our natural resources programs improve public understanding, help landowners and communities use those assets for sustainable long-term social and economic development and conserve natural resources for future generations. **291 Macomb County residents participated in natural resources programs in 2022.**

Invasive species such as the box tree moth pose an enormous threat to Michigan's biodiversity and economic well-being. MSU Extension provides educational resources such as the Identification Guide to Boxwood and its Lookalikes to identify, assess, and control invasive species throughout the state. **141** residents from Macomb County participated in in-person and online programs to learn more about invasive species.

FINANCIAL HOMEOWNERSHIP EDUCATION

MSU Extension provides resources and education on money management, foreclosure prevention, buying a home, retirement planning and more to help residents and their families to become more financially healthy.

In 2022, **531** residents participated in financial homeownership education programs such as Surviving and Thriving on a Fixed Income, Savvy Tips for Starting a Small Business, Retirement Myths and Facts, Protecting your Identity, Property Tax Foreclosure Basics, Informed Renter, and more.

KEEPING MACOMB FAMILIES IN THEIR HOMES

MSU Extension believes an educated customer will be more confident in making important decisions about foreclosure. Free foreclosure education and counseling is available to assist homeowners in understanding the process of foreclosure, to provide the education a homeowner must have to assess their situation and work with a lender to obtain a loan modification.

In partnership with the Macomb County Treasurer's Office, **121** residents facing tax foreclosure received free financial coaching and budgeting education.

MSU PRODUCT CENTER

Strategy development and implementation is crucial to a business's long-term success. The MSU Extension Product Center is an organization that brings together on-campus expertise in the sectors of food, agriculture, and natural resources to help entrepreneurs define and launch innovative products. Field-based innovation counselors advise entrepreneurs on business planning, regulatory requirements, and product development needs.

72 Macomb County residents received client counseling from the Product Center in 2022.

CHILDREN & YOUTH

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Michigan 4-H is growing current and future leaders. The largest youth development organization in Michigan, 4-H provides thousands of young people with experiential learning opportunities to explore new interests and discover their passion. In 2022, **1,162** Macomb County youth participated in **161** programs.

ENVIRONMENTAL & OUTDOOR EDUCATION

4-H environmental and outdoor education teaches youth about science and ecology, interrelationships and impacts, health, and positive outdoor experiences. As a result, youth learn to appreciate and respect the connection between people and nature.

INSPIRING FUTURE SCIENTISTS

4-H science activities facilitates opportunities that encourage youth to make observations, ask questions, design solutions to problems, test ideas and discover answers while exploring and learning about their world.

CHILDHOOD & FAMILY DEVELOPMENT



48 Macomb County preschoolers participated in environmental education programs and learned about soil science and natural resources conservation.

MSU Extension provides early childhood and family development programs that help parents, caregivers, childcare providers, and other important adults in the lives of children from birth to age 8 develop important skills. These programs focus on school readiness, social-emotional development, and positive life skill development. In 2022, **305** Macomb County residents participated in these programs.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS HEALTH & NUTRITION

Through MSU Extension's nutrition and physical activity programming, Michigan adults, families and children gain crucial knowledge about nutrition and healthy foods, increase their daily activity and improve their food security. In 2022, 2,977 residents participated in Macomb County health and nutrition programs.

MSU Extension partners with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services to provide SNAP-Ed, a nutrition education program designed to reduce hunger and food insecurity and promote healthy eating habits for people who are eligible for food assistance programs like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). MSU Extension SNAP-Ed community nutrition instructors teach youth, individuals, and families how to make health a priority. In 2022, 1,144 Macomb County residents participated in SNAP-Ed programs, such as Eat Healthy Be Active, Cooking Matters, Senior Project FRESH, and Show Me Nutrition.

And this has helped my family. I find my cart full of fresh fruits, vegetables and more lean meats. I try to stay away from processed foods which were previously my easy go-to. SUPPORTING STRONG COMMUNITIES

In 2022. 1.037 Macomb residents participated in MSU Extension's social-emotional health programs to learn how to manage their anger. reduce stress, thrive as caregivers, practice mindfulness and strengthen their families' and communities' understanding of and response to mental health crises. Residents participated in 176 programs including **RELAX:** Alternatives to Anger, Stress Less with Mindfulness. Mental Health First Aid, Powerful Tools for Caregivers, and more.

FOOD SAFETY

As a result of MSU Extension's food safety and food preservation programming, 331 adults in Macomb County learned how to reduce their risk of illness when preparing food and to preserve food safely, childcare providers learned how to reduce foodborne illnesses in the children they care for, and food service managers, workers and volunteers learned how to protect their customers' health and sell food products safely and legally.
